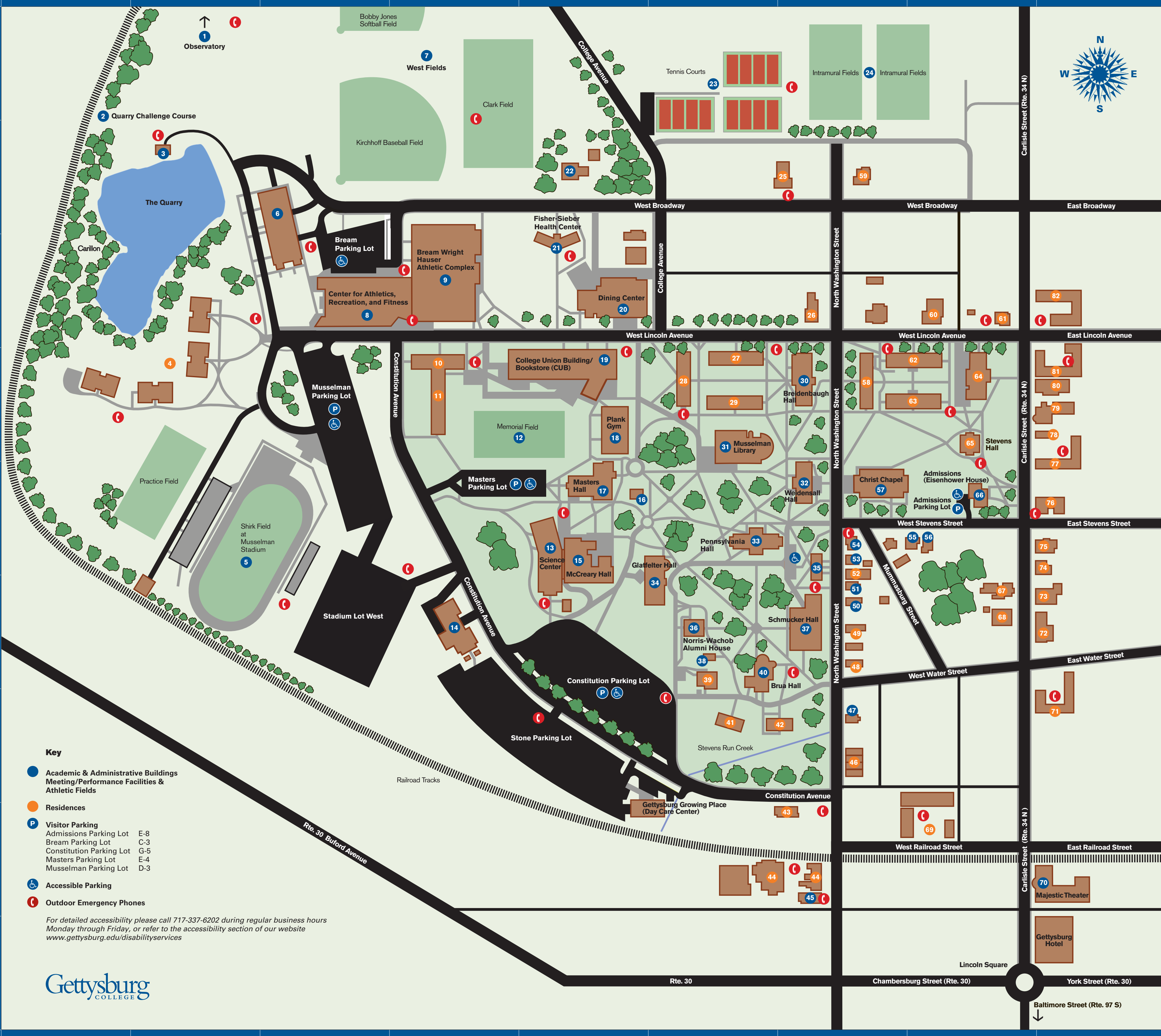

Welcome to Gettysburg

Two things make Gettysburg College's location extraordinary. One is what's here. Our 200-acre campus connects to a world-famous and engaging town, where you'll find an eclectic array of stores, restaurants, and cultural offerings that includes the Majestic Theater, which showcases student and professional performances. Further afield, outdoors enthusiasts enjoy the area's challenging white-water, rock climbing and mountain biking, three nearby ski and snowboard resorts, and outstanding hiking trails, including the Appalachian Trail. Gettysburg is also an easy distance from major metropolitan areas: 90 minutes from Washington, D.C., an hour from Baltimore, 45 minutes from the state capital of Harrisburg, and two and a half hours from Philadelphia.

What happened here is the other thing that makes our setting special. The campus sits amidst the site of what many consider to be the single most important event in American history—the Battle of Gettysburg. The battle was the turning point in the Civil War, and its outcome defined the future of the United States. A few months after that event, Gettysburg College alumnus David Wills invited President Lincoln to deliver a two-minute speech that stands today as one of the most moving expressions of the ideals of freedom and equality ever spoken. Today, Gettysburg welcomes approximately three million visitors to the town and National Military Park.

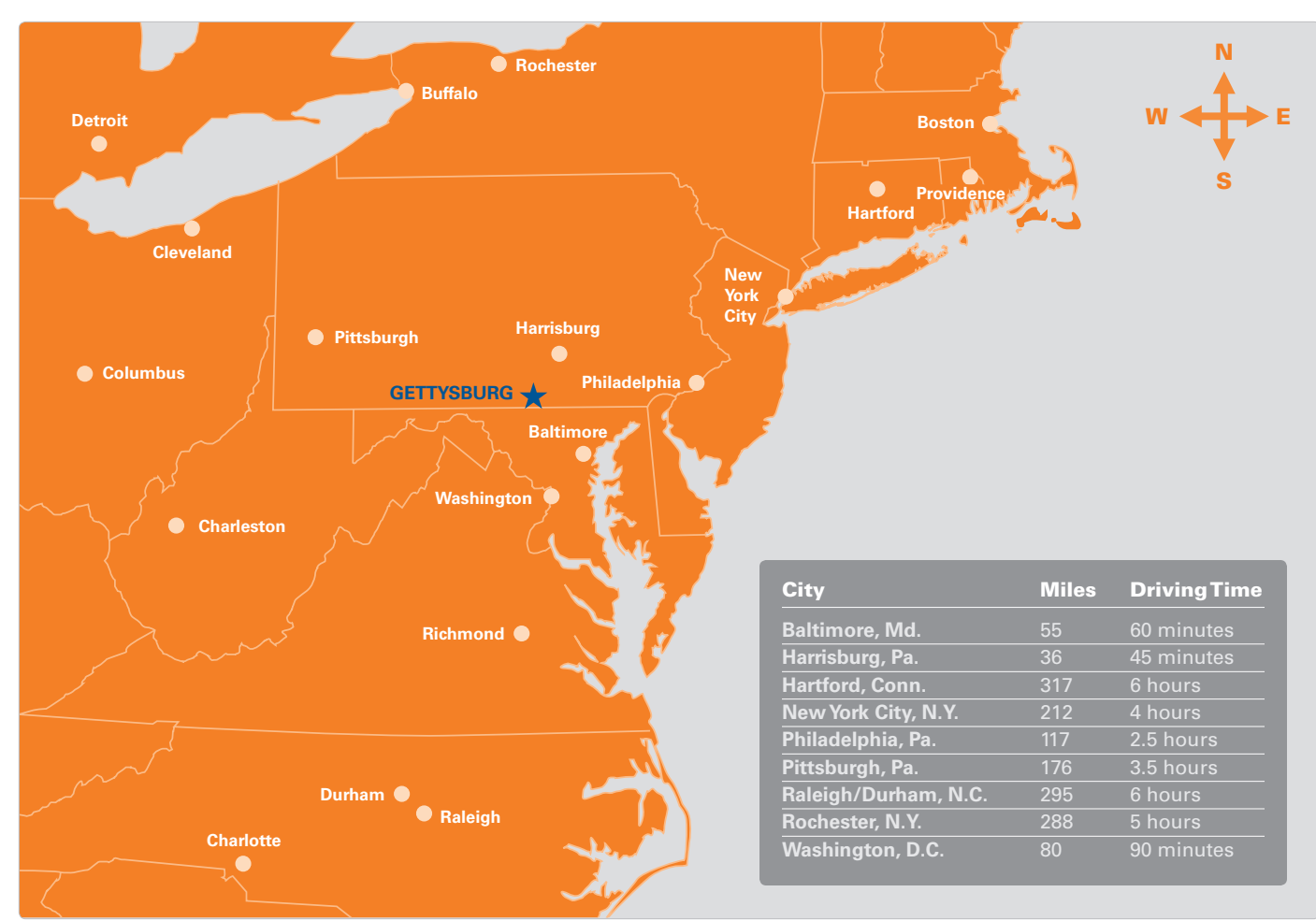

A Tradition of Excellence

Founded in 1832 and now recognized as a nationally ranked college of the liberal arts and sciences, Gettysburg College's history is one of strong academic reputation, social justice, and actively engaged students.

Abolitionist Thaddeus Stevens was an early supporter of the College, donating the land that serves as the present-day campus. Since then, the town has witnessed the decisive Battle of Gettysburg and welcomed two presidents, Lincoln and Eisenhower. It was Gettysburg College alumnus David Wills, class of 1851, who invited President Abraham Lincoln to town to make a "few remarks" in what would come to be known as the Gettysburg Address. A century later Gettysburg was the home to President Dwight D. Eisenhower, who joined the College's Board of Trustees and wrote his memoirs in what is now the Admissions Office.

Today, Gettysburg continues to prepare students to make a difference in the world. Students prepare for leadership through an extensive career network, undergraduate research, experiential learning opportunities, and countless co-curricular, service, and off-campus study activities. They earn Rhodes, Fulbright and Goldwater scholarships, and perform alongside professionals in the Sunderman Conservatory of Music. They think innovatively about new approaches to problem-solving in technology and in the sciences. They deeply engage in social justice through programs in the Center for Public Service, and think critically about issues in public policy through research with the Eisenhower Institute. An education at Gettysburg emphasizes critical thinking skills, broad vision, effective communications, sensitivity to the human condition, and a global perspective, all necessary to enable students to realize their full potential for responsible citizenship.
